Notification of Available Fund Balance for the Indian Gaming Special Distribution Fund, California Gambling Control Commission

Section 12713 of the Government Code states: "The Department of Finance, in consultation with the California Gambling Control Commission shall calculate the total revenue in the Indian Gaming Special Distribution Fund that will be available for the current budget year for local government agencies impacted by tribal gaming. The department shall include this information in the May Budget revision." Section 12713 also requires the annual report to include the following information:

- The total amount of payments to the Indian Gaming Special Distribution Fund actually received in the prior fiscal year and projections for the current fiscal year (Attachment 1).
- The amount of appropriations made for the previous ten fiscal years from the Indian Gaming Special Distribution Fund for local government agencies impacted by tribal gaming pursuant to section 12012.85 (Attachment 2).
- The total number of tribes and the name of each tribe that make payments into the Gaming Special Distribution Fund (Attachment 3).

The attached fund condition statement shows revenues and expenditures for the fund through 2022-23 (Attachment 1). In 2016-17, the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund needs approximately \$11.8 million to fulfill the quarterly payment obligations to non-gaming and limited gaming tribes. Given the projected revenues, the Indian Gaming Special Distribution Fund will be able to transfer \$11.8 million to the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund, so all payment obligations can be made.

Historically, Revenue Sharing Trust Fund revenues have been insufficient to fully fund distributions to eligible recipient tribes. In 2017-18, however, it is anticipated that Revenue Sharing Trust Fund revenues will be sufficient to fully fund Revenue Sharing Trust Fund distributions and a transfer will not be needed from the Indian Gaming Special Distribution Fund in 2017-18 or in subsequent fiscal years.
