(b) For the purposes of this section, "unqualified person" means a person who is found to be unqualified pursuant to the criteria set forth in Section 19857, and "disqualified person" means a person who is found to be disqualified pursuant to the criteria set forth in Section 19859.

8. Business and Professions Code section 19824 provides, in part:

The commission shall have all powers necessary and proper to enable it fully and effectually to carry out the policies and purposes of this chapter, including, without limitation, the power to do all of the following:

* * *

- (b) For any cause deemed reasonable by the commission, deny any application for a license, permit, or approval provided for in this chapter or regulations adopted pursuant to this chapter, limit, condition, or restrict any license, permit, or approval, or impose any fine upon any person licensed or approved. The commission may condition, restrict, discipline, or take action against the license of an individual owner endorsed on the license certificate of the gambling enterprise whether or not the commission takes action against the license of the gambling enterprise.
- (d) Take actions deemed to be reasonable to ensure that no ineligible, unqualified, disqualified, or unsuitable persons are associated with controlled gambling activities.

9. Business and Professions Code section 19854, subdivision (a), provides:

Every key employee shall apply for and obtain a key employee license.

- 10. Business and Professions Code section 19870 provides:
 - (a) The commission, after considering the recommendation of the [Bureau] chief and any other testimony and written comments as may be presented at the meeting, or as may have been submitted in writing to the commission prior to the meeting, may either deny the application or grant a license to an applicant who it determines to be qualified to hold the license.
 - (b) When the commission grants an application for a license or approval, the commission may limit or place restrictions thereon as it may deem necessary in the public interest, consistent with the policies described in this chapter.
 - (c) When an application is denied, the commission shall prepare and file a detailed statement of its reasons for the denial.

(d) All proceedings at a meeting of the commission relating to a license application shall be recorded stenographically or by audio or

- (e) A decision of the commission denying a license or approval, or imposing any condition or restriction on the grant of a license or approval may be reviewed by petition pursuant to Section 1085 of the Code of Civil Procedure. Section 1094.5 of the Code of Civil Procedure shall not apply to any judicial proceeding described in the foregoing sentence, and the court may grant the petition only if the court finds that the action of the commission was arbitrary and capricious, or that the
- Business and Professions Code section 19871 provides:
 - The commission meeting described in Section 19870 shall be conducted in accordance with regulations of the commission and as

(b) Nothing in this section confers upon an applicant a right to discovery of the department's investigative reports or to require disclosure of any document or information the disclosure of which is otherwise prohibited by any other provision of this chapter.

SPECIFIC STATUTORY AND REGULATORY PROVISIONS

12. Business and Professions Code section 19854, subdivision (b) provides:

No person may be issued a key employee license unless the person would qualify for a state gambling license.

13. Business and Professions Code section 19856, subdivision (a) provides, in part:

The burden of proving his or her qualifications to receive any license is on the applicant.

14. Business and Professions Code section 19857 provides, in part:

No gambling license shall be issued unless, based on all of the information and documents submitted, the commission is satisfied that the applicant is all of the following:

- (a) A person of good character, honesty, and integrity.
- (b) A person whose prior activities, criminal record, if any, reputation, habits, and associations do not pose a threat to the public interest of this state, or to the effective regulation and control of controlled gambling, or create or enhance the dangers of unsuitable, unfair, or illegal practices, methods, and activities in the conduct of controlled gambling or in the carrying on of the business and financial arrangements incidental thereto.
- 15. Business and Professions Code section 19859, subdivision (d) provides:

The commission shall deny a license to any applicant who is disqualified for any of the following reasons:

(d) Conviction of the applicant for a misdemeanor involving dishonesty or moral turpitude within the 10-year period immediately preceding the submission of the application, unless the applicant has been granted relief pursuant to Section 1203.4, 1203.4a, or 1203.45 of the Penal Code; provided, however, that the granting of relief pursuant to Section 1203.4, 1203.4a, or 1203.45 of the Penal Code shall not constitute a limitation on the discretion of the commission under Section 19856 or affect the applicant's burden under Section 19857.

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FIRST CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF LICENSE APPLICATION

(Mandatory Denial - Conviction of a Crime of Dishonesty)

16. Respondent's application for a key employee license is subject to mandatory denial pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 19859, subdivision (d), in that Respondent suffered two misdemeanor criminal convictions involving dishonesty within 10 years immediately prior to his submitting his application, for which he has not been granted relief pursuant to sections 1203.4, 1203.4a, or 1203.45 of the Penal Code.

On or about August 26, 2013, Respondent was convicted, upon a plea of guilty, of two counts of violating Revenue and Taxation Code, section 19706, willful failure to file or make a fraudulent tax return, in the case of *People v. Su'a* (Super. Ct. Orange County, 2012, No. 12NF3312).

SECOND CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF LICENSE RENEWAL

(Unsuitable for Licensure)

17. Respondent's application for a key employee license is subject to mandatory denial pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 19857, subdivisions (a) and/or (b), in that Respondent has demonstrated that he is not a person of good character, honesty, and integrity; and/or, that he is a person whose prior activities and criminal record pose a threat to the public interest of this state, to the effective regulation and control of controlled gambling, or create or enhance the dangers of unsuitable, unfair, or illegal practices, methods and activities in the conduct of controlled gambling or in the carrying on of the business and financials arrangements incidental thereto.

On or about October 15, 2010, Respondent willfully and unlawfully failed to file a tax return and supply information for the taxable year 2009, with the intent to evade properly paying taxes; and with the intent to willfully make, render, sign, and verify a false or fraudulent tax return or statement, and to supply false or fraudulent information.

On or about October 15, 2011, Respondent willfully and unlawfully failed to file a tax return and supply information for the taxable year 2010, with the intent to evade properly paying

taxes; and with the intent to willfully make, render, sign, and verify a false or fraudulent tax return or statement, and to supply false or fraudulent information. As a result of the above unlawful conduct, Respondent, upon a plea of guilty, suffered two misdemeanor criminal convictions, as alleged in paragraph 16 above and incorporated herein by reference. PRAYER WHEREFORE, Complainant requests that following the hearing to be held on the matters herein alleged, the Commission issue a decision: Denying the Application for Gambling Establishment Key Employee License submitted by John Su'a; and Taking such other and further action as the Commission may deem appropriate.
